THE "COLLINSWORTH" TOURING CAR

A few years ago, I, (Danny Schaiewitz) heard that Clark Collins had built his own car. Being a little suspicious, I assumed that it must have been a kit car, one of those you assemble. I sent him a note asking for a picture and comments. He obliged and it turned out not to be a kit car but one he made from scratch. The roadster frame was from a Steadman auto made in England forty years earlier. The engine for the modern-Gothic car was a Ford Mustang 5.O 302 GT with a five speed Mustang transmission and rear-end gearing. That was the start, a frame with an engine. He had in mind what he wanted so he designed and then carried out the task of building a working auto. It took five and a half years pretty much full time. Clark did all the exterior work himself. The electrical wiring of the car he paid for and the installation of a fully working custom air-conditioning unit plus the wheels. As you can see by the picture it's also a convertible. Not bad for his first car he built. Clark named his "Touring Car" the CollinsWorth.













THE "PERFECT PUTTER"

Another ambitious project that Clark started in 2006 was a golf book about the story of the famous Odyssey-Callaway 2-Ball Putter originally patented by Clark. Clark called it "The Perfect Putter". Though it took him years to complete, the book is now within months of going to the publisher. It's a powerful story of invention theft, corruption, fraud, fraud on the Court and about six other legal counts in the case. In this billion dollar case, Clark's attorney's also sold him out and Clark holds nothing back. These are strong statements one would conclude. But Clark has the proof and if he didn't, the book would never have been accepted by his publisher due to libelous reasons. Though there was a settlement in the case, with coercion to settle by his attorneys, Clark could not accept the deal willingly. I will send a note to all when this book comes out. The title of the book is THE GREAT CALLAWAY PUTTER HEIST.
